### **Children's Wonderland opens at Tam-O-Shanter**



### **Jonah Meyer-Crothers Day**

Meyer-Crothers was a member of the United States Men's Cerebral Palsy National Soccer Team that won the 2025 COPA America International Federation of Cerebral Palsy Football played in the International Tournament in Uruguay in October. He was also named the Most Valuable Player of the tournament. Meyer-Crothers is a 2022 graduate of Sylvania Northview, where he was a member of the soccer team. He is currently a student at Calvin University, Grand Rapids, Mich., and a member of their soccer team.

### Main Street is now ADA accessible

The city is on track to complete its first transformational phase of downtown Main Street since 1983.

Phase 1 of the D o w n t o w n Transportation Improvement Project be-

tween Monroe Street and Maplewood Avenue has entered the final stages of construction. The city is ready to begin the Aerial Utility Bury Project in December that will relocate four aerial utilities below grade in the second block between Maplewood Avenue and Erie Street. Phase 2 will start in July and will more than double the on-street parking and will bring the usability and appearance of the two blocks into focus.

Old concepts from the 1983 design were carried forward including on-street parking, heavy use of brick for streetscaping, and of course, trees.

New concepts, based on public input, included a curb-less street design, more downtown seating, wider sidewalks, and enhanced electrical capabilities for festivals and events.

However, the most impactful change was the creation of an accessible downtown.

City leadership engaged Sylvania partners at the Ability Center of Greater Toledo from the project onset in May 2023. By July, the Ability Center had prepared a 55-page document citing accessibility "red flag" issues in the first block to be considered. The document photographed every store front entrance, outlined problems, and made reasonable recommendations on how to address with the city project. The goals and objectives were clear...create a downtown with as many accessible business front entrances as possible.

Prior to this construction project it was hard to see that the west side buildings were, on average, 18 inches HIGHER than their counterparts on the east side. This elevation

difference was not something widely thought about, or, much less addressed in public infrastructure projects in the 1980s. A simple task like entering a store front alongside friends and family for a day of shopping or dinner could have kept those with disabilities away in years past.

with disabilities away in years past.

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) wasn't instituted in the United States until 1990 and it took years afterwards for requirements to start to be visible in public works. Today we take for granted things like curb ramps, reduced slopes and step heights, door widths for wheelchairs, and bathroom facilities to make public spaces more usable for the disabled community.

The design team had an arduous challenge of creating a curb-less street, with tough elevation constraints, that was disabled-friendly. To accomplish the goal, the west sidewalks were raised to store front heights and the street lowered. The project was reverse engineered, starting at the building facades and working towards the roadway centerline to establish new grades. Planter walls helped accomplish the grade changes on the west side and intermediate steps were provided at strategic locations for those non-disabled users to have immediate store front access.

The west side and east side store fronts were linked together with a raised midblock speed table, creating a unified accessible path. Parking stalls without curb barriers were created to allow those users easy access to the sidewalk and the accessible path. There are 26 of the 28 business store fronts on Main Street that are now ADA accessible.

Main Street was platted in 1835 in the "Plan of the Town of Whiteford" as "Division Street." It wasn't a division that brought about change, but rather a true partnership with a local asset to help make a vision become a reality. The city is grateful for the Ability Center's guidance and is proud of the finished product. Division Street was left behind a long time ago and Main Street can now be used by all for generations to

In 1973 the Haymarket Square complex was built by Eugene Paul using an old car dealership block building and creating a space for commercial retail businesses. The outside of the building was made to look like an old-fashioned town, and give the feel of the "Old West." His idea included an old-fashioned boardwalk along the front of the various businesses and signs above reading: "The Pet Emporium," "The Prospector Art Supplies," "Custard's Last Stand Restaurant," "General Store Gifts" and "Sodbuster Saloon."

The parcel that is the parking lot today originally had a large house on it that had been constructed in 1851 when William Warren owned the property. From 1851 until 1904 the home belonged to Mr. Warren, and then his widow. In 1904 his widow, Sarah Warren, sold the home and property to George Mickens, and then in 1909 John and Mattie Crandall purchased the house. The 1909 photo shows their adopted daughter Anna in front.

John lived here until he died in 1917, and

Mattie until she passed away in 1925, leaving the home to their adult children, Frank, Lou and Fred Crandall. With the three of them each living in other states, they gave the house to their adopted sister, Anna Rosenbrook, in 1928 and the family said that it was their gift to her for taking care of their father and mother in their final years.

After Mattie Crandall died Anna married Ernest Schaber and the two of them lived in the home until he died in 1957 and she died in 1961. While living here Schaber was selling automobiles and doing radiator and body repair out of the barn on this property. A 1924 building permit issued to Mattie Crandall allowed alterations to the barn. The work was being done by Ernest Schaber and included sheet metal work, a cement floor, new windows and a chimney. A 1927 advertisement shows Schaber Top & Radiator Shop operating at this address

In 1946 Schaber purchased the property to the north and used the home on that property as his sales office, but soon after demolished the home and built a small cement block building. Then a permit from 1949 shows him hiring Ed Plum and Art Iron Works to add a 45-foot by 70-foot cement block addition to that structure where he operated Schaber Motor Sales until he retired in 1957. That was the year he began renting the cement block building to Vin Devers. In 1957 Schaber obtained a building permit to remove the front portion of the old barn behind his home and seal up the front and build an awning.

Ernest Schaber died in 1957 and Anna Schaber continued to rent the cement block building to Devers. She lived in her home to the south until she passed away in 1960. A January 1961 advertisement shows Devers selling Mercurys, Comets and English Fords. Vin Devers purchased both parcels from the estate in 1962, and by April the Sylvania Sentinel reported that Cote Wrecking Company started demolishing the former home of Ernest and Anna Schaber.

In October of 1963 Vin Devers was issued a building permit to add a 12-foot by 19-foot cement block addition to the front of the commercial building. He continued to sell new and used cars from this property until 1968, when

it just became too congested for his growing business, and he moved his operation to Monroe Street.

From 1969 through 1972 the building was leased to Jaranko Surplus Sales, and in July of 1973 the property was purchased by Phyllis Paul, wife of builder Eugene Paul. That same month a building permit was issued to convert the building into a multiple unit commercial shopping complex, with a second story added to a portion of the building where Paul had his offices.

Although Eugene Paul passed away this year at the age of 100, his legacy in Sylvania will live on forever.




